John Roberts led the service for Disability Sunday, drawing on a theology of inclusion and disability from the work of the locally based Disability, Spirituality and Faith Network, as well as the Ecumenical Disability Advocacy Network affiliated to the World Council of Churches.

there enjoying themselves, while another two little boys had fun pushing a doll's pushchair around the room.

There are weekly visits and a monthly Holy Communion with church members in the hospital wing and apartments at the Charles Fleming Rymans retirement village. Two of the congregation who recently spent time in Wellington Hospital are now back in their own homes. Our small church family keep in close touch and care for each other.

On 14 July Kapiti Coast District Council held a drop-in session 2 pm to -5 pm at the church lounge to talk about a draft proposal to rezone the Old Beach area of Waikanae Beach. This would create a specific Beach Residential Zone for implementation later this year. Our church is within the area where the draft rezoning is being considered. The proposal includes a number of site-specific provisions and rules which relate to subdivision, development of the land, limits to the footprint of a building on any site.

The proposal was sent to Wendy Anderson, the property person in the Methodist Connexional Office in Christchurch, for comment. She responded: "I have had a quick look at your files. It would seem the site and height restrictions apply to new buildings." She wondered if the new zoning would affect rates, future access changes, seismic strengthening or changes to the buildings, possible subdivisions. Marie Smith attended the drop-in session. She reported to the congregation that the new zone would not impact on the church building and site as things stand at present.

World Council of Churches 70th Anniversary


The World Council of Churches (WCC) celebrates its 70th anniversary this month. The founding assembly was held in Amsterdam in August 1948. The



three partner churches that are part of Kapiti Uniting Parish - Methodist, Presbyterian and Christian Churches NZ - are member churches.

Rev. John Roberts will lead a service to celebrate this landmark year at Waikanae next Sunday 5 August, at 9.15am. John graduated from the WCC's Ecumenical Institute at Chateau de Bossey, near Geneva, in 1978. He attended the Canberra Assembly in 1991 as a visitor, and the Harare Assembly in 1998 as an official representative of the Methodist Church of NZ. John served on the WCC's Central Committee from 1991 to 1998.

His PowerPoint presentation will briefly cover some WCC history, what the WCC does, and outline the connection between the WCC and the NZ member churches. There will be a small display in the church lounge at morning tea time. All those interested are warmly invited.

Amnesty International News

A recent Amnesty Newsletter had some good news stories



Anwar Ibrahim has been released after two decades of political persection. He is the longstanding leader of the opposition in Malaysia and an Amnesty International Prisoner of Conscience. Peaceful political dissent was not tolerated in Malaysia and he was arrested and beaten in 1998. There have been many campaigns calling for his release but he has now received a royal pardon and can take part in politics again.

Zunar's travel ban has been lifted. Another longstanding Prisoner of Conscience, he has been arrested multiple times under Malaysia's draconian Sedition Act for his outspoken criticism of the Government. He uses his cartoons to raise awareness of corruption and the abuse of power in the country. In 2016 he was stopped from travelling overseas but his travel ban has now been lifted.

Bobomurod is released. In Uzbekistan, journalism is a high-risk job. Publishing articles that are critical of the Government can have serious consequences, as Bobomurod Abdullayev found out as a writer for the Institute of War and Peace Reporting. During seven months in detention he was repeatedly tortured by National Security Service officers trying to force him to confess to bogus charges. After multiple Amnesty appeals the Tashkent City Court has now released Bobomurod.

If you would like to help free people, **go to Amnesty International's webpage** – **amnesty.co.nz** – and click on **Take Action** where there are lots of letters you can sign. Two of the current campaigns are:

Tell Egypt to free Shawkan. Photojournalist Shawkan is facing the death penalty because he took photos of the police violence that killed hundreds of people at a protest in Cairo's streets in August 2013. He has suffered torture during this five years in prison and isn't receiving medical treatment.

Demand Myanmar release Reuters Journalists. Two Reuters journalists, Wa Lone and Kyaw Soe Oo, were arrested in December while investigating atrocities by Myanmar's security forces against the Rohingya people. They now face 14 years in prison.

It also features in Revelation, being praised for its perseverance, but also receiving a reprimand, which, thinking

about it, could provide the subject matter for an evening's discussion!

In our 8 July meeting, divided into two separate groups, Cliff Couch asked us to consider the question \sim "Who or what is Jesus today?" as individuals and then to provide a single sentence answer, which we were able to consider together.

Group One saw Jesus as: A wise man, in the way he lived and in what he taught espoused humanity in its ideal form which still relates to us today.

Group Two saw Jesus as: An older brother who died before us and who is an inspiration we can look to for examples of how to live.

If anyone feels that they could help do some of these jobs please contact us through the office.

- Remove white powder on several brick columns.
- Finish black vinyl strips on doors.
- Paint hall steps handrails.
- Nails on the hall deck need hammering/screwing back down
- Church entrance. Varnish bottom sill of window.
- Repair paint on small area of hall wall above steps. Urgent.
- Paint end wall of Thrifty
- Wiring of sound desk in church
- Paint letterbox post, sign frame and rear handrail.
- Investigate front spouting on church, blocked or leaking.
- Build set of shelves in shed for paint storage.
- Wash all building windows outside.
- Water blast front and end walls of Thrifty Place to remove salt.
- Investigate/replace small downpipe at front of hall roof.

What does the church mean to me /you?

Ephesians 5:1-2. Watch what God does, and then you do it like children who learn proper behaviour from their parents. Mostly what God does is love you. Keep company with Him and learn a life of love.

So, what does the Church mean to me? In a word – EVERYTHING!!! I grew up in a family where going to church on Sunday morning and evening (if there was a service) was what you did.



What I share with you today comes from my share of the service of 24 June led by George Forster, Gordon Prentice and myself. All retired lay preachers!!!! Our theme was 'What the Church means to me' and what I share with you today will be excerpts from my sermon.

I have very vivid memories of walking to church as a wee fellow. Father on the outside me in the middle and Mother pushing the pram, plus sister. And later as we were about 8 or 9 walking to Sunday School at Shirley Methodist and picking blackberries growing by the footpath!!

A very strong foundation was laid down in my teen years with our wonderful youth group at Edgeware Road Church in Christchurch. Eventually there were engagements, then marriages!! We all attended services as a group, morning and evening then invited ourselves to the parsonage for supper on the way home!!

So for me, I wouldn't want to be anywhere else on Sunday morning, but at worship. I don't feel right, somehow if I miss out Worship with God's people in God's House. It is the place where we feed our faith in God. In worship we are reminded that God is available to each of us, every moment of every day, walking with us in every circumstance of our lives.

So what does this mean for us as a Parish? It means that we provide a safe, loving Church community for each other in honesty and sensitivity, whether we are new to the faith or mature in the journey, encouraged and supported knowing with certainty that God is always present.

Raumati Village Community Garden


